DEAR JOE, THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT OF OUR MODEM PROJECT. IT MAKES SUCH A PROJECT WORTH THE EFFORT WHEN PEOPLE ACTUALLY ENJOY USING IT.

IN ISSUE # 30 YOU MENTIONED THAT TESTING OF THE PROJECT WAS A BIT DIFFICULT. THERE IS A SIMPLE WAY AROUND THIS. MAKE UP A PLUG WHICH FITS INTO THE VZ RS-232 SOCKET LIKE IN THE EXAMPLE AT BOTTOM OF PAGE OR IN THE CASE OF DB9 OR DB25 SOCKETS TEMPORARILY CONNECT PINS 2 & 3 TOGETHER. THIS CONNECTS THE TXD OUTPUT SIGNAL TO THE RXD INPUT SIGNAL SO THAT YOUR MODEM TALKS TO ITSELF.

BOOT UP THE MODEM SOFTWARE, SELECT FULL DUPLEX AND ENTER THE TERMINAL MODE. SELECT CTRL-8 OR CTRL-9 TO TEST. A CONTINOUS STREAM OF IDENTICAL CHARACTERS SHOULD BE SENT AND RECEIVED BY YOUR MODEM. WITH CTRL-8 YOU SHOULD SEE A DISPLAY OF U'S. WITH CTRL-9 YOU SHOULD SEE A STREAM OF IDENTICAL GRAPHIC BLOCKS.

IF THE DATA IS JUMBLED YOU MAY NEED TO SELECT 2 STOP BITS. EXIT FROM THE TEST MODE WITH CTRL-C. TRY TYPING A MESSAGE. IT SHOULD APPEAR ON THE SCREEN AS YOU TYPE IT. NOW SELECT HALF DUPLEX. TWO OF EACH CHARACTER WILL APPEAR ON THE SCREEN, BECAUSE YOU ARE ECHOING BACK YOUR OWN DATA.

VZ MODEM USERS: I AM TRYING TO GET A LIST OF VZ MODEM USERS. ANYONE WHO USES A MODEM OR TERMINAL CAN BE ON THE LIST. PLEASE REALIZE THAT VZ'S CAN ONLY USE 300 BAUD AT PRESENT. (MORE ON THAT ANOTHER TIME.) IF ANYONE WANTS TO BE ON THE LIST, I NEED THEIR NAME, PHONE NUMBER, AND OPERATING TIMES. I.E. WHEN IS THE PHONE FREE?? WILL YOU SISTER, MUM, WIFE LET YOU USE THE PHONE?

I CAN BE CONTACTED MOST NIGHTS BETWEEN 7.30PM - 9.00PM. HOWEVER I PREFER TO BE CONTACTED ON SATURDAYS BETWEEN 12 NOON - 4PM. MY WIFE MAY BE USING THE PHONE DURING THE WEEK. BUT I HAVE HER PERMISSION!! TO USE IT ON SATURDAYS.



UTILITIES FOR DSE DISK DATABASE 31/6 BY JOHN D'ALTON

Now that I no longer publish my own magazine LE'VZ 200/300 OOPs I hope to have time to contribute to the remaining VZ newsletters.

THESE UTILITIES AND MODIFICATIONS ARE FOR USE WITH AND TO ENHANCE THE DATABASE UNIT THAT WAS WRITTEN BY MR PHIL MAUDE (PM DB) AND SOLD BY DICK SMITH ELECTRONICS. IT IS A DISK BASED UNIT ONLY.

MR MAUDE HAS NOW LIFTED COPYRIGHT ON THE UNIT SO IT IS NOW IN THE PUBLIC DOMAIN. FOR FOLK WHO WISH TO MODIFY THEIR PRESENT PM DB UNITS AND REQUIRE HELP TO "UNLOCK" IT PLEASE CONTACT MYSELF OR SOME OTHER VZ "SPECIALISTS" IN THIS REGARD. ONLY REQUESTS BY MAIL THAT INCLUDE A S.A.S.ENVELOPE WILL BE ANSWERED.

The unit as sold is a basic unit to conserve memory and be easy to operate. I know that these various enhancements and utilities will make the original unit more useful than ever. These sections could be added to the original PM DB as required or as stand alone units.

1. TRANSFER DATA FROM MAILLIST:

THIS TRANSFERS DATA FROM THE DSE MAILLIST DISK UNIT WHICH IS A MODIFIED UNIT. NO NEED TO TO TYPE IN ALL YOUR DATA.

2. ALTER THE SYSOP DATA:

WITH THE ORIGINAL PM DB, THERE IS NO WAY OF ALTERING THE AMOUNT OF FIELDS, THE LENGTH OF THEM OR THE AMOUNT OF COLUMNS FOR THE PRINTER. NOW ALL THESE CAN BE CHANGED, ADDED TO OR DELETED.

3. SEARCH ON ANY FIELD:

THE ORIGINAL PM DB ALLOWS SEARCHING ON THE FIRST FIELD ONLY.
NOW A SEARCH CAN BE PERFORMED ON ANY FIELD AND ALL THE WAY ALONG IT,
NOT JUST THE FIRST FOUR CHARACTERS.

- 4. PRINT FIELDS IN ANY ORDER:
 YOU CAN SELECT THE FIELDS TO BE PRINTED AND IN ANY ORDER.
- 5. SORT ON ANY FIELD:
 THIS ALLOWS ALPHA SORT ON ANY FIELD, NOT JUST THE FIRST FIELD.
- 6. EDIT ON SCREEN:

EACH FIELD IS PRINTED ON SCREEN SO ALLOWING YOU TO RUN THE CURSOR ALONG IT OR TYPE NEW DATA.

7. EDIT SELECTED RECORD:

IF FOR INSTANCE THERE ARE THREE ZUBRIGEN RECORDS, YOU CAN EDIT THE FIRST, SECOND OR THIRD RECORD, NOT JUST THE FIRST ONE.

- I MAY BE ABLE TO PUT FORWARD SOME OTHER ENHANCEMENTS IN DUE COURSE, OR PERHAPS FOLK COULD CONTACT ME FOR HELP ON OTHER FEATURES THAT MAY BE REQUIRED.
- I WILL EITHER WAIT FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE INTERESTED TO CONTACT EITHER THE EDITOR OF THIS MAGAZINE OR MYSELF, OR I SHALL GO AHEAD AND SUBMIT THE INFORMATION IN DUE COURSE. . . . (J.D.)

JOHN D'ALTON 39 AGNES STREET TOOWONG QLND 4066

THIS PROJECT IS BUILT AROUND THE POPULAR 555 TIMER CHIP. VERY VERSATILE CHIP MADE FOR PRECISION TIMING APPLICATIONS. IT IS A IS CONNECTED IN THE ASTABLE MULTI-VIBRATOR MODE ITS OUTPUT WILL GIVE PRECISE ON AND OFF TIMES WITH RESPECT TO THE RESISTANCE AND CAPACITANCE NETWORK BEING USED.

WHEN THE OUTPUT IS ON (OR HIGH) THE CAPACITOR IS BEING CHARGED VIA 2 RESISTORS AND WHEN THE OUTPUT IS OFF (OR LOW) THE CAPACITOR IS BEING DISCHARGED VIA ONE RESISTOR. IT IS THIS LOW PART OF THE CYCLE I HAVE USED IN THIS PROJECT. BY CONSTANTLY MONITORING THE OUTPUT OF THE TIMER, VIA THE INPUT PORT OF THE VZ, WE CAN DETECT WHEN THE TIMER GOES FROM ITS HIGH TO LOW STATE.

THEN BY INCREMENTING A COUNTER FOR THE PERIOD THAT THE OUTPUT IS LOW WE WILL THEN HAVE A VALUE OR "NUMBER" WHICH REPRESENTS THE RESISTOR AND CAPACITOR BEING USED. IF ONE OF THESE COMPONENTS WERE TO BE CHANGED THEN A NEW NUMBER WOULD RESULT, BUT THIS NEW NUMBER WOULD HAVE RELATIONSHIP TO THE OLD NUMBER, SO ONCE WE KNOW THE NUMBER FROM THE COUNTER WE CAN USE IT IN VARIOUS WAYS. IN THE CAPACITANCE TESTER I HAVE ELECTED TO USE FOUR DIFFERENT VALUES OF FIXED RESISTANCE AND THE CAPACITOR IS THE COMPONENT THAT VARIES.

THE COUNTING IS DONE IN A MACHINE CODE PROGRAM AND THE HL REGISTER PAIR IS USED AS THE COUNTER. IN EACH OF THE FIRST THREE RANGES THE MAXIMUM COUNT THAT CAN BE ACHIEVED IS 255 THEN AN OVERFLOW WILL OCCUR AND THE "CHANGE RANGE" MESSAGE WILL APPEAR ON THE SCREEN. TO ACHIEVE THIS MAXIMUM COUNT FOR EACH RANGE A CAPACITOR EQUAL TO THE MAXIMUM VALUE FOR THAT RANGE IS CONNECTED AND ITS RESISTOR IS ADJUSTED TO GIVE

THE BOTTOM END IS A DIFFERENT STORY, AN OFFSET HAS TO BE ADDED TO GIVE THE CORRECT READING AT THE BOTTOM END OF THE RANGE. TO DO THIS EACH RANGE HAS A NEGATIVE VALUE ASSIGNED TO THE VARIABLE B. (LINES 210, 240, 270 AND 300 IN THE BASIC PROGRAM), THIS VALUE IS POKED INTO THE COUNTER SO THAT THE COUNTER ACTUALLY COUNTS BACK FROM A NEGATIVE NUMBER TO ZERO THEN FORWARD TO 255.

THE VALUE OF THE NEGATIVE NUMBER USED IS SELECTED TO SUIT THE CAPACITANCE AT THE BOTTOM END OF THE RANGE. WHAT WE NOW HAVE IS A COUNTER THAT WILL BE AT ZERO FOR A KNOWN VALUE OF CAPACITANCE AND 255 FOR ANOTHER KNOWN VALUE. ANY VALUE IN BETWEEEN WILL BE RELATED TO THE CAPACITOR BEING USED. THE FOURTH RANGE IS EXACTLY THE SAME THEORY EXCEPT THAT BECAUSE OF THE HIGH VALUES OF CAPACITANCE BEING USED THE COUNT IS CONSIDERABLY GREATER THAN 255.

THE CAPACITANCE TESTER IS ONLY ONE APPLICATION OF THE 555 TIMER. THERE HAS BEEN A WHOLE HOST OF CIRCUITS DESIGNED AROUND IT. BY USING THE ABOVE THEORY A LOT OF THOSE PROJECTS COULD BE ADAPTED TO SUIT THE VZ. OTHER IDEAS THAT COME TO MIND ARE :-

FREQUENCY METER. ANALOGUE TO DIGITAL CONVERTER. POSITION INDICATOR FOR A SHAFT OR LEVER. TEMPERATURE METER. LIGHT METER, ETC, ETC.

TO ANYONE THAT WISHES TO EXPERIMENT FURTHER THEN PLEASE LET US KNOW THE RESULTS OF YOUR EFFORT OR IF YOU NEED HELP OR ASSISTANCE THEN IT IS AS CLOSE AS A LETTER OR PHONE CALL TO MYSELF OR THE EDITOR. ADDRESSES AND PHONE #'S ARE AT REAR OF JOURNAL.

CONSTRUCTION:

THIS PROJECT IS DESIGNED TO BE PLUGGED INTO THE 8 BIT INPUT PORT FEATURED IN ISSUE # 30 OF THE JOURNAL AND WONT WORK WITHOUT IT.

CONSTRUCTION IS STRAIGHT FORWARD. CUT A PIECE OF VERO BOARD TO THE LENGTH OF A SMALL UTILITY BOX AND CUT THE COPPER STRIPS AS SHOWN BY X'S. SOLDER IN THE EIGHT WIRE BRIDGES FIRST (NOT FORGETTING THE ONE MOUNTED UNDER THE I.C.) FOLLOWED BY THE REMAINING COMPONENTS. NEXT, USING SHORT LENGTHS OF HOOKUP WIRE, (PIECES FROM RIBBON CABLE ARE IDEAL) SOLDER IN THE 3 POLE 4 POSITION SWITCH. 1 POLE ISN'T USED.

MAKE SURE TO ORIENTATE THE LEADS CORRECTLY. SOLDER IN TWO PIECES REASONABLY HEAVY FLEXIBLE CABLE ABOUT 6 CM'S TO BE USED FOR OF CONNECTING THE CAPACITOR UNDER TEST, MULTI METER TEST LEAD IS IDEAL. TERMINATE LEADS WITH ONE RED AND ONE BLACK ALLIGATOR CLIPS OR PREFERABLY TEST CLIPS AS MENTIONED IN THE PARTS LIST. LAST SOLDER IN A 30 CM LENGTH OF SEVEN WIDE RIBBON CABLE WITH A 15 PIN 'D' PLUG ATTACHED TO COMMUNICATE WITH THE VZ VIA THE 8 BIT INPUT PORT.

THE VERO BOARD FITS VERTICALY AND LENGTHWISE IN THE BOX AND AS FAR TO ONE SIDE AS POSSIBLE SO AS TO ALLOW ROOM FOR MOUNTING THE SWITCH ON AT ABOUT THE MIDDLE OF THE LID AND UP TOWARDS THE SIDE A DRILL A HOLE FOR MOUNTING THE SWITCH. AT ONE END OF THE BOX CUT TWO SLOTS AT THE TOP OF THE BOX FOR FOR THE CAPACITOR LEADS TO FIT SO THAT WHEN THE LID IS SCREWED DOWN IT WILL HOLD THE LEADS IN PLACE FIRMLY, CONNECT A BLACK ALLIGATOR OR TEST CLIP TO THE GROUND LEAD AND A RED ONE TO THE OTHER LEAD.

CALIBRATION:

THE ONLY REAL WAY TO CALIBRATE THE TESTER PROPERLY IS TO USE CAPACITORS OF A KNOWN VALUE. IF YOU HAVE NONE AVAILABLE THEN YOUR TESTER WILL ONLY BE AS GOOD AS THE ERROR OF THE ONES THAT YOU USE WHICH WILL STILL BE ACCEPTABLE BY MOST STANDARDS.

THE CALIBRATION PROCEDURE FOR EACH OF THE FOUR RANGES IS THE SAME THE ONLY DIFFERENCE BEING THE VALUE OF THE CAPACITORS FOR EACH RANGE. FOLLOW THE STEPS BELOW AND YOU SHOULD HAVE NO PROBLEMS. IN STEP 5 YOU WILL HAVE TO LIST THE PROGRAM AND ALTER THE VALUE ASSIGNED TO VARIABLE FOR THE PARTICULAR RANGE YOU ARE WORKING ON.

ONCE YOU HAVE ESTABLISHED THE CORRECT VALUES IN YOUR BASIC PROGRAM THEN THIS IS THE PROGRAM YOU SAVE AND USE WITH YOUR SYSTEM. IT MAY PAY YOU TO WRITE THESE FIGURES DOWN AND SAVE THEM SOMEPLACE IN CASE YOU SHOULD EVER LOSE YOUR ORIGINAL PROGRAM IN SOME WAY OTHERWISE YOU'LL HAVE TO RECALIBRATE.

YOU'LL NEED THE TEST CAPACITORS AS SHOWN IN THE PARTS LIST:

- STEP 1: SELECT THE REQUIRED RANGE.
- 2: CONNECT THE CAPACITOR FOR THE HIGH END OF THE RANGE.
- 3: ADJUST THE TRIMPOT TO READ THAT VALUE.
- STEP 4: CONNECT THE CAPACITOR FOR THE LOW END OF THE RANGE.
 STEP 5: CHANGE THE VALUE IN BASIC OF VARIABLE B FOR THE RANGE THAT YOU ARE CALIBRATING.
- STEP 6: REPEAT STEPS UNTIL THE RANGE READS CORRECTLY AT EACH END.



SMALL ROUTINES IN ASSEMBLER TO HELP YOU WRITE BETTER PROGRAMS

MANY OF YOU WILL HAVE A TAPE OR DISK ASSEMBLER OF SOME SORT. YOU MAY WANT TO WRITE MORE PROGRAMS IN IT BUT ARE WONDERING HOW TO CONVERT SOME SIMPLE BASIC ROUTINES INTO ASSEMBLY LANGUAGE.

THIS ARTICLE CONTAINS SOME SHORT ROUTINES TO HELP YOU GET ON YOUR WAY. AS THEY STAND ON THEIR OWN THEY WILL NOT DO MUCH. THEY MUST BE PUT TOGETHER TO DO SOMETHING USEFUL. THE PROGRAM THAT MOVES A DOT AROUND THE SCREEN IS SUCH A PROGRAM.

WHEN YOU FIRST LOOK AT ASSEMBLER IT MAY BE PRETTY MEANINGLESS BUT YOU WRITE MORE PROGRAMS AND THEREFORE LEARN MORE YOU UNDERSTAND IT BETTER. SOME OF THE ROUTINES I HAVE WORKED OUT MYSELF, OTHERS FROM THE TECHNICAL REFERENCE MANUAL, OTHERS FROM STEVE OLNEY'S BOOK AND A FEW ARE BY JOHN MAUNDER, (THE MODE(1) ENTRY, THE HORIZONTAL LINE AND DELAY ROUTINES).

SET (X,Y)-POKE-M/C BY JOE LEON 31/13

NEEDED SOME HI-RES DISPLAY AND MESSAGE SCREENS FOR THE NEWCASTLE COMPUTER SHOW. THE PROGRAM I WAS USING WAS A BIT PRIMITIVE, BUT IT DID THE JOB. I SOON REALISED THE SCREENS WOULD LOOK BETTER IN OTHER COLOURS BESIDES GREEN. IT DIDN'T TAKE LONG TO DISCOVER I KNEW NEXT TO NOTHING ABOUT USING SET(X, Y) WHICH HAS MYSTIFIED ME AND HAD TO GO AND LEARN THE BASICS QUICK SMART.

IT SOON BECAME OBVIOUS THAT CHANGING SCREEN COLOURS USING SET(X,Y) PAINFULLY SLOW. SO I TRIED THE POKE WAY WHICH WAS A BIG WAS IMPROVEMENT BUT STILL SLOW. THAT ONLY LEFT MACHINE CODE WHICH WAS LIKE MAGIC. THE DEMO PROGRAM DEMONTRATES ALL THREE METHODS.

MODE (1) SCREEN COLOURS:

A MODE(1) (HI-RES) SCREEN HAS A RESOLUTION OF 128 X 64, A TOTAL OF 8192 PIXELS OR SCREEN LOCATIONS WHERE WE CAN EITHER SWITCH ON OR OFF ANY PIXEL AT ANY INDIVIDUAL LOCATION.

SET (X, Y)
X = 0 TO 127 AND IS COUNTED HORIZONTALLY ACROSS THE SCREEN. Y = 0 to 63 and is counted vertically down the screen.

POKING SCREEN COLOURS:

THIS METHOD INVOLVES POKING ACTUAL MEMORY (VIDEO RAM) LOCATIONS WITH THE DESIRED SCREEN COLOUR CODE.

28672 = START ADDRESS OF HI-RES SCREEN. 30719 = END ADDRESS OF HI-RES SCREEN.

M/CODE SCREEN COLOURS:

THE Z80'S POWERFUL BLOCK MOVE ROUTINE IS CALLED UPON TO DO ITS MAGIC AND I'M SURE YOU'LL AGREE, IT IS LIKE MAGIC.

THE ORIGINAL USR CALL ROUTINE APPEARED IN AUSTRALIAN PERSONAL COMPUTER FEBRUARY 86 ISSUE. IT CONSISTED OF 13 BYTES AND GARY GOT RID OF SOME UNECCESSARY CODE REDUCING IT DOWN TO ONLY FOUR BYTES. ED.

IF YOU ARE WRITING A BASIC PROGRAM WHICH HAS A LOT OF CALLS TO MACHINE CODE SUBROUTINES THEN THIS PROGRAM MAY BE OF ASSISTANCE TO YOU. THE FOUR BYTE MACHINE CODE PROGRAM IS LOADED AHEAD OF YOUR BASIC PROGRAM AND ITS START ADDRESS IS LOADED INTO THE USR PROGRAM POINTER. THIS IS DONE BY USING:—

POKE 30862, LO BYTE: POKE 30863, HI BYTE

NOW EVERY TIME YOU WANT TO JUMP TO A MACHINE CODE PROGRAM, USE THE COMMAND X=USR(ADDRESS). THE (ADDRESS) BEING YOUR MACHINE CODE PROGRAM ADDRESS IN DECIMAL. THE WAY IT WORKS IS SIMPLE, BEFORE CONTROL IS PASSED TO THE USR ROUTINE (WHICH IS THE 4 BYTE ROUTINE) THE VALUE OF (ADDRESS) IS STORED IN MEMORY LOCATIONS 31009-31010 AS A LO BYTE, HI BYTE NUMBER OR ADDRESS. THE 4 BYTE PROGRAM NOW LOADS THIS ADDRESS INTO THE HL REGISTER AND USES THE COMMAND JP (HL) TO JUMP TO YOUR MACHINE CODE PROGRAM.

AFTER YOUR MACHINE CODE PROGRAM HAS ENDED ANY DATA RESULTING FROM THAT PROGRAM CAN BE STORED IN LOCATIONS 31009-31010. THIS DATA WILL THEN BE AUTOMATICALLY PASSED BACK TO BASIC TO 'X' AND IT CAN THEN BE USED IN YOUR BASIC PROGRAM.

A GOOD PLACE TO PUT THE 4 BYTES WOULD BE AT THE BEGINNING OF ONE OF YOUR MACHINE CODE PROGRAMS OR IN ONE OF THE UNUSED SECTIONS OF THE COMMUNICATION REGION AS IS USED IN THE DEMONSTRATION PROGRAM BELOW.

FLICKER-FREE GRAPHICS 31/15 BY BOB KITCH

MENTION THE WORD "FLICKER" AND SOME PEOPLE IMMEDIATELY THINK OF THE HORSE IN THAT WELL KNOWN TV SERIES! VZ USERS WHO HAVE PLAYED DSE'S DAWN PATROL KNOW DIFFERENTLY.

FLICKER OR HASH ON THE VZ SCREEN IS THAT ANNOYING "RUBBISH" THAT OCCURS, PARTICULARLY ON THE HI-RES SCREEN, WHENEVER ANYTHING IS WRITTEN TO VIDEO RAM (VRAM). IT IS MOST OFTEN OBSERVED WHEN GRAPHICS ARE BEING USED. THERE ARE TWO CAUSES OF FLICKER IN GRAPHICS -

I/ CRITICAL FLICKER FREQUENCY AS PERCEIVED BY THE EYE. THIS IS A FORM OF "JUMPINESS" DETECTED BY THE EYE (I.E. PHYSIOLOGICAL) WHENEVER FRAME RATES DROP BELOW 50 Hz OR 50 PER SECOND, MOVIE THEATRE PROJECTORS AND THE VIDEO SCREEN ON THE VZ ARE UPDATED EVERY 20 MSEC. AND SO SMOOTH GRAPHICS RESULT. BELOW THIS FREQUENCY, THE EYE SEES A JERKY IMAGE AS IS SOMETIMES SEEN IN OLD MOVIES.

II/ VIDEO IRREGULARITIES RESULTING FROM DISPLAY DESIGN PROBLEMS, FLICKER OR HASH IN THE VZ RESULTS FROM THE DIRECT LOADING OF VRAM FROM Z80 REGISTERS. THE ELECTRON BEAM OF THE DISPLAY SCANS EVERY 20 MSEC. INDEPENDANTLY OF THE PROGRAM INTENTIONS. VRAM IS MEMORY MAPPED INTO 512/2K BYTE AREA DEPENDING UPON MODE. CONFLICTS IN THE TIMING OF THE Z80 CPU WRITING TO - AND THE 6847 VDG READING FROM - THE VRAM CAUSE THE FLICKER.

CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING EXAMPLE TO UNDERSTAND THE EFFECT, THE ASCII CODE FOR A CHARACTER IS LOADED INTO VRAM FROM A Z80 REGISTER. THE 6847 VIDEO DISPLAY GENERATOR (VDG) TRANSLATES THIS INTO THE INTENSITY OF THE ELECTRON BEAM AS IT SCANS ACROSS THE SCREEN. THE Z80 DOES NOT, AND CANNOT, DRAW DIRECTLY ONTO THE SCREEN. THIS IS THE JOB OF THE VDG CHIP.

A SCREEN IS DRAWN EVERY 20 MSEC. BUT THE Z80 MAY LOAD DATA INTO VRAM IN A FRACTION OF A MSEC. AND AT ANY TIME. THUS, THE Z80 HAS NO IDEA OF WHERE THE ELECTRON BEAM IS WHEN IT UPDATES VRAM. THE ELECTRON BEAM SCANS ACROSS THE SCREEN MANY TIMES TO FORM A COMPLETE CHARACTER. AS THE VDG IS UPDATING THE SCREEN THE Z80 MAY CHANGE THE CHARACTER IN VRAM BEFORE IT IS COMPLETED BY THE VDG. (WHAT A CONFUSING MESS FOR THE SCREEN TO TRANSFER TO THE EYE!), A "SPLIT" SECTION OF SCREEN SCAN LINES MAY OCCUR MOMENTARILY IN THIS SITUATION.

IDEALLY, ALL INTENDED SCREEN UPDATES SHOULD TAKE PLACE AT AN "INVISIBLE MEMORY LOCATION" OR "BUFFER". AT A SUITABLE TIME, A BLOCK LOAD INSTRUCTION CAN MOVE THE BUFFER INTO VRAM. THIS TRANSFER SHOULD OCCUR AHEAD OF THE ELECTRON BEAM.

WHAT IS NEEDED IS SOME ABILITY FOR THE Z80 TO DETERMINE THE POSITION OF THE ELECTRON BEAM ON THE SCREEN AT ANY GIVEN MOMENT.

IT IS WORTH CLARIFYING HERE, SOME OF THE HARDWARE NOMENCLATURE USED SO THAT READERS ARE QUITE CLEAR AS TO WHAT IS GOING ON. VRAM AND BUFFER ARE AREAS OF MEMORY IN THE Z80'S ADDRESS SPACE. THE Z80'CPU CAN READ AND WRITE (UPDATE) TO THESE LOCATIONS QUITE FREELY, VRAM IN THE VZ IS A FIXED AREA OF MEMORY THAT IS ALSO REFERENCED BY THE 6847 VDG. THE LOCATION OF THE BUFFER IS CHOSEN BY THE PROGRAMMER AND THEREFORE THE VDG DOES NOT KNOW WHERE IT EXISTS. OBVIOUSLY THE POTENTIAL FOR CONFLICT, BETWEEN THE TWO DEVICES' REQUESTS FOR ACCESS TO VRAM, EXISTS HERE. THE SCREEN OR DISPLAY IS A PHYSICAL DEVICE THAT THE Z80 KNOWS NOTHING ABOUT. (THE VZ WILL RUN WITHOUT A SCREEN).

THE VDG AND A LOT OF DISPLAY CIRCUITRY INTERFACE BETWEEN VRAM AND THE IMAGE FORMED BY AN ELECTRON BEAM SCANNING ACROSS PHOSPHORS. THE VDG CONTAINS AN INTERNAL ROM HOLDING A SHAPE TABLE THAT DECODES ASCII INTO VISUAL IMAGES. ONCE THESE COMPONENTS ARE CLEARLY DISTINGUISHED, AND THEIR ABILITY TO COMMUNICATE AMONGST THEMSELVES IS APPECIATED, IT BECOMES EASY TO DEVISE A SOLUTION TO THEIR MUTUAL INTERFERENCE THAT LEADS TO FLICKER.

THE INTERRUPT (AS DETAILED IN MY PREVIOUS ARTICLE ON VECTORS, INTERRUPTS AND REAL TIME CLOCK) IS ONE SUCH TIMING PULSE THAT CAN ASSIST. EVERY 20 MSEC. AN INTERRUPT SIGNAL IS DEVELOPED BY THE VDG. WHEN THE INTERRUPT OCCURS, THE Z80 COMPLETES THE CURRENT INSTRUCTION AND THEN VECTORS TO THE INTERRUPT HANDLING ROUTINE. AFTER COMPLETION OF THIS ROUTINE, THE Z80 RESUMES ITS PREVIOUS TASK. THE INTERRUPT PULSE ORIGINATES FROM THE VDG AND IS NOTIFIED BY *FS LINE.

THIS IS CONNECTED TO THE MASKABLE INTERRUPT LINE ON THE Z80 WHICH CAN BE ENABLED/DISABLED BY SOFTWARE COMMANDS. THE IMPORTANT FEATURE OF THE *FS LINE GOING LOW IS THAT IT ALLOWS VIDEO SYNCHRONIZATION OF THE ELECTRON BEAM LOCATION ON THE SCREEN WITH THE Z80 WRITE-TO-VRAM ACTIVITY. (I.E. EXACTLY WHAT WE ARE LOOKING FOR) BY DETECTING THE MASKABLE INTERRUPT EVENT IN THE Z80 IT IS POSSIBLE TO TIME VRAM WRITE-OPERATIONS SUCH THAT FLICKER IS AVOIDED. TO SEE HOW THIS IS ACHIEVED, IT IS NECESSARY TO CONSIDER HOW THE SCREEN SCANNING HAPPENS.

THE VZ TECHNICAL MANUAL AND MY ARTICLES IN SEPT. AND CCT. AEM 1986, PROVIDE SOME INSIGHT INTO SCREEN SCANNING AND THE WORKINGS OF THE VDG. THE ELECTRON BEAM STARTS AT THE TOP LEFT-HAND CORNER OF THE SCREEN AND MOVES TO THE RIGHT. IN SO DOING, THE VDG PUTS ONTO THE DISPLAY, PART OF 32 CHARACTERS ON THE SCAN LINE. (THIS IS OF COURSE DESCRIBING THE LO-RES SCREEN SITUATION).

DURING THIS TIME, THE INTENSITY OF THE BEAM IS REGULATED BY THE VDG REFERENCING VRAM. A "HORIZONTAL RETRACE" OCCURS THAT IS INVISIBLE - ALSO THE BEAM DROPS DOWN ONE SCAN LINE (THIS PERIOD CORRESPONDS TO 8 "INVISIBLE" CHARACTERS BEING SCANNED). THERE ARE ACTUALLY 192 "VISIBLE" SCAN LINES DOWN THE VZ SCREEN. THIS CORRESPONDS TO 12 SCAN LINES PER LINE OF TEXT. THE VDG CERTAINLY EARNS ITS KEEP TRANSLATING 32 ASCII REPRESENTATIONS PER LINE INTO ELECTRON BEAM INTENSITIES!

SO MUCH FOR THE VISIBLE OR ACTIVE PORTION OF THE SCREEN. THERE ARE ALSO "INVISIBLE" PORTIONS OF THE SCREEN — FOR EXAMPLE THE TOP AND BOTTOM BORDERS OF THE SCREEN. ALSO, ONCE THE ELECTRON BEAM REACHES THE BOTTOM RIGHT—HAND PORTION OF THE SCREEN, IT MUST "FLYBACK" TO THE TOP LEFT—HAND CORNER. THIS IS CALLED THE "VERTICAL RETRACE".

THERE IS ALSO ANOTHER PERIOD CALLED "BLANKING" WHICH IS A TIMING PAUSE TO ALLOW THE OVERWORKED ELECTRON BEAM TO CATCH ITS BREATH BEFORE COMMENCING ANOTHER SCREEN! GOT ALL OF THAT! IN TOTAL, ALL OF THIS BEAM ACTIVITY CORRESPONDS TO 312 SCAN LINES - AND IT ALL OCCURS IN 20 MSEC. OR 50 TIMES PER SECOND. FOR THOSE WHOSE MATHS CAN STAND IT, EACH SCAN LINE TAKES 0.064 MSEC. AND EACH LO-RES TEXT LINE TAKES 0.77 MSEC. FOR THE VDG TO PLACE UPON THE SCREEN.

THIS SET-UP CAN BE ILLUSTRATED BY THE FOLLOWING SUMMARY -

- 50 LINES (3.21 MSEC.) TOP BORDER.
- 192 LINES (12.31 MSEC.) ACTIVE DISPLAY.
- 51 LINES (3.27 MSEC.) BOTTOM BORDER.
- 6 LINES (0.38 MSEC.) VERTICAL RETRACE.
- 13 LINES (0.83 MSEC.) BLANKING.
- 312 LINES (20.00 MSEC.)

THE *FS LINE OF THE VDG GOES LOW (HIGH TO LOW TRANSITION) AT THE END OF THE ACTIVE DISPLAY AREA - I.E. BEFORE THE BOTTOM BORDER IS REACHED. THE TIME WHEN THE ELECTRON BEAM IS SCANNING "INVISIBLE" PORTIONS OF THE SCREEN IS MARKED BY THIS SIGNAL, WHICH, IN TURN, TRIGGERS THE MASKABLE INTERRUPT IN THE Z80. DURING THIS TIME, THE CPU MAY HAVE TOTAL ACCESS TO VRAM WITHOUT CAUSING UNDESIRABLE FLICKER ON THE SCREEN. THE AMOUNT OF TIME AVAILABLE TO THE Z80 IS 7.69 MSEC. OUT OF THE 20 MSEC. BETWEEN EACH SCREEN REFRESH. NOTE HOWEVER, THAT THE LOW TO HIGH TRANSITION OF *FS COINCIDES WITH THE TRAILING EDGE OF THE VERTICAL SYNC PULSE - THAT IS, IT STAYS LOW FOR ONLY 3.65 MSEC. OR SOME 18% OF THE REFRESH CYCLE.
